

Emma Martin is a Senior Lecturer in Museology at University of Manchester and from 2003-2020 was Senior Curator for National Museums Liverpool (NML). This role accounted for a significant part of more than 25 years of experience as a curator of collections from South Asia, the Himalayas and Tibet. Her research sits at the intersection of colonialism(s), Tibetan

Studies, museum activism, and materiality and moves between contemporary museum practice in Tibetan exile contexts and historical research on Tibetan materiality in British colonial archives. As a practice-based researcher, Emma is currently the curatorial advisor to the museum at the <u>Dalai Lama Centre for Tibetan and Ancient Indian Wisdom</u> in Bodhgaya, India.

Between 2017-2023, she acted as curator/advisor to the <u>Tibet Museum</u>, a major museum development for the Central Tibetan Administration, otherwise known as the Tibetan government-in-exile (opened in 2022). Her forthcoming book for Routledge is *The Dissident Museum: Oppositional Curating at The Tibet Museum*.
