The tram stop is fitted with JCDecaux billboards—"the world's largest Out-of-Home advertising company" framing media across public spaces from Amsterdam to Azerbaijan, London to Lesotho, New York to Nicaragua. The abbreviation of the company name to "JC" masks to the average bystander waiting at the bus stop, the foundational story of "Jean-Claude" Decaux, inventor of the advertising bus shelter. From putting up posters in the

street to advertise his parents' shop in the small French city of Beauvais, to shaping urban spaces in 3,670 cities across the world, Jean-Claude is described as a visionary but also a conqueror, alluding to the inseparability of power and visibility. An insatiable spread of bus shelters and public toilets transforming public sites of waiting and defecating into spaces of spectatorship and consumption.

The tram stop is fitted with a poster advertising a Frida Khalo exhibition at the Cobra Museum, 8 A Love Revolution. Frida Khalo, "currently the most famous woman artist in the world," whose paintings circulate on a global merry-go-round of institutions, collections, auctions, and audiences. According to the curator, "Khalo's work, which addresses pressing themes such as political and social engagement, hopes to inspire the public in our museum." Meanwhile, outside the museum, Khalo's iconic visage leaks into more ambivalent relationships with the public. Her powerful gaze is obscured by the cartoonish graphic of a neoclassical façade, stuck to Khalo's face like an eye patch. Her mouth is covered by a crude hand-drawn sign with "unvaccinated lives matter" scrawled in marker, silencing a voice renowned the world over for a radical body politics and the refusal of patriarchal ableist conventions. Is this part of the museum's political and social engagement?

The Real Conspiracy Theorists

I didn't immediately assume that Mohamed was homeless or an asylum seeker. Living in Brixton the sight of black people selling things on the street from makeshift stalls is part of the urban fabric. Part of what incoming property developers refer to as the "vibe" and "buzz" of an area they seek to monetize and sanitize. I first met Mohamed outside the Albert Heijn on Kruisstraat and from then on, each day we ventured out in the city we would see him. "Salaam!" "Keif al-hal?" "Tamam!" He speaks some Arabic, he's from Burundi, and he's met some Sudanese people before. In the overwhelming whiteness of Haarlem, even a Black British person like myself, distant and removed from their own heritage as is typical of

the diasporic condition, holds some welcome familiarity. My brother is called Mohamed too. "Wallahi!"

Each time we meet Mohamed his story thickens. He is from Burundi and he came to the Netherlands seeking asylum. He has been in Haarlem for fifteen years living in accommodation for the homeless and supported by a church organization that gives him free meals. He sells copies of Straatjournaal; homeless people buy and sell the product, making a profit of &1.20 from each copy. Mohamed says Haarlem is a good city, a beautiful city, much better than Amsterdam because the people are friendly and he isn't hassled by the police all the time. He works Monday to Saturday, either outside the Albert Heijn or the Hema, and must work hard because the margins are small. Mohamed doesn't have any family. Every month, for the last fifteen years, Mohamed has to travel one hundred and thirty kilometers and pay &50 for a train ticket to Zwolle, to bring his identity papers for verification by immigration officials to determine that he is still in the country. "All societies produce strangers; but each kind of society produces its own kind of strangers, and produces them in its own inimitable ways."  $^{11}$ 

Mohamed told us he is a local celebrity in Haarlem. Everyone knows him. When he was arrested his picture was on the front page of the newspaper and even the mayor expressed sympathy for his case. None of this seems to have changed much about Mohamed's circumstances in that he still stands on the street outside supermarkets selling newspapers and puzzle books, guilt and obligation. Mohamed is a "public character." Someone "sufficiently interested to make himself a public character," a public character "need have no special talents or wisdom to fulfill his function ... His main qualification is that he is public, that he talks to lots of different people." Amidst the canals, bicycles, and boats, staples of the city of Haarlem's publicity and self-image, is Mohamed—a familiar stranger. 13

Many of the streets in and around Schalkwijk are named after countries and cities from across Europe. Sprawling out like tributaries from the major highway Europaweg, we walked through England, Denmark, Sweden, Belgium, Luxemburg, Italy, Poland, Bulgaria, Milan, Madrid, Copenhagen, Dublin, Athens, and London. All within the space of a kilometer. Like the "London Perambulator," as we walked we tried to commit these landscapes to our mind, a "conscious walk" where the fringes begin to shape your ways of seeing the city. 16

Naming streets is an ideological act of demarcating political territory and power, often masquerading as a banal or democratic process for the public. It often comes unstuck because who or what constitutes the "public" changes over time, yet street names remain concrete and their connotations inescapable. In Spain they passed a Historical Memory Law over a decade ago that called on local government to remove Francoist-era symbols from public space. In the UK's increasingly bitter "culture war," the local council in Birmingham was attacked by right-wing commentators and Conservative MPs for using "woke" names like Equality Road and Diversity Grove for new streets on a housing development.

The only two streets in Schalkwijk named after non-European places are Amerikaweg and Surinamepad. Where most of the world has now been shaped by American imperialism, the Dutch have of course their own violent and exploitative histories. Surinam, a colony of the Kingdom of the Netherlands for almost four hundred years, where slave plantations and rich natural resources fuelled the Dutch Golden Age through cotton, sugar, sweat, blood, rubber, gold, and tears. The Frans Hals Museum now lives in the fruits of this bounty; the Vleeshal building sits center stage in Haarlem's "old town"—an edifice of the ongoing material privileges of empire and colonialism.

Surinamepad is a largely mundane street that seems to be part of a ground zero of urban development in the area. We walk past Heras fences and plywood hoardings, porter loos and industrial waste skips. The haze of construction hangs in the air. "Ruins in reverse." Outside the Snuffelmug second hand store stands a trolley stacked with old plastic chairs and a handwritten sign stuck to it saying, "AFRIKA." Directly across the road is the old tax office, a curiously distinctive but abandoned building with rows of blue balconies and now furnished with a large sandy yellow advertising board with the word "ROOTZ" printed in black military-style font. According to the website of the developer overseeing this transformation, "ROOTZ is a place where everyone feels at home. Young or old, starter or transitioner, single or cohabiting, a one-person or family household—there is a place for everyone. Current and future residents live happily together here." 18
