

In the universities in South Africa, as Amina Mama argues, instances of sexual abuse and gender violence and their institutional and administrative tolerance have been part of everyday life.

The gangs, thought to include cheap labour in the form of EU immigrants, arrive by the vanload, sneak into hidden glades in the woods and

plunder all the mushrooms, fleeing before anyone spots them

It is understood they then arrange deals to supply unscrupulous hotel and restaurant kitchens who charge a small fortune to serve up tasty treats on diners' plates.

Mr Tarnoff spoke out at the monthly Court of Verderers, who look after the forest.


The court also heard from Brockenhurst farmer Sara Cadbury who said little had been done to tackle the problem since she first raised the issue five years ago.

She said mushrooms were an important cog in the natural fabric of the forest.
