"<u>Die Tä</u>-ler noch von Ei-"

Avoiding foreshadowing of the minor modulation, there is a lightness of articulation and tone here.

"Die" is coloured gently, the airflow just sufficient for the pitch and vowel to sound cleanly, but without any focussing or nourishing of the tonal core.

The quality of a speech-like **ee-vowel** colours "**Tä-**", which is sung in a more closed position than when spoken to emphasise the higher resonances.

"Die Tä-<mark>ler noch</mark> von Ei-"

"-ler", a more open vowel, is the first glint of the forthcoming darker tonality.

The vowel opens – shifting from the slim, airy and bright resonance of "Die <u>Tä</u>-" to more the darker colours of a more "chesty", guttural, primal resonance.

The note facilitates a transition to the more established and distinct tone of "**noch**", coinciding with the downbeat left hand chord of the piano.
